It rained, and rained and rained. But between the showers, one player seized the opportunity to prove that he'd developed into one of the deadliest attacking bowlers in world cricket. 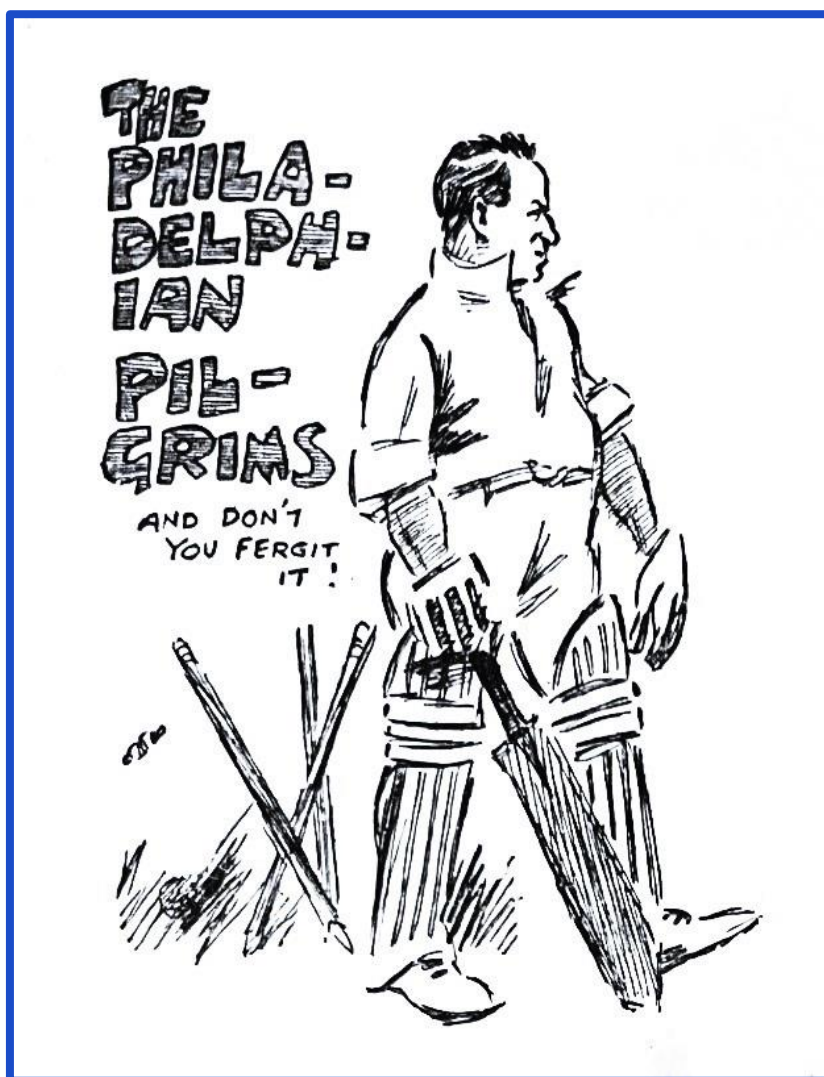
3. **SMITH. Steve:** Cricket - the Philadelphia story... The 1878 Australians. 2024. 8vo (iv) + 72pp, illustrated. Original pictorial hard cloth, **new. Limited edition of 20 hardback copies, signed by Steve Smith.** *Returning home after a successful tour of England, the Australians, led by Dave Gregory, stopped off in North America in October of 1878 to play several matches, the second of which was the inaugural first-class match in Philadelphia. The three-day match between Philadelphia and the Australians took place at Nicetown, the ground of Germantown Cricket Club, and upwards of 10,000 were in attendance during the opening day's play. The grandstand was 'thronged with the youth and beauty' of the city and the Philadelphian XI, which included the four Newhall brothers, Bob, Charley, Dan, and George, acquitted themselves superbly against the Australians. Throw in an umpiring controversy and the threat of the game being abandoned, not to mention the possibility of monies being withheld, and it is evident that the match provided quite an eventful beginning to first class cricket in the city.* (Stock ref 8453) **£38**

5. **MUSK.** Stephen: *The Forgotten Philadelphians. The Pilgrims' Tour in England, 1921.* 2024. 8vo (iv) + 112pp, illustrated. Original pictorial hard cloth, **new. Limited edition of 20 hardback copies, signed by Stephen Musk.** *In 1921, a side known as the Philadelphia Pilgrims crossed the Atlantic and played 12 fixtures, albeit none of first-class status. If referred to at all, this tour is written off as an irrelevant, alcohol-fuelled jolly made by a bunch of ageing has-beens. This book, which includes match reports and scorecards of all the fixtures, aims to redress the balance. The Pilgrims played against all-amateur sides of a high quality and were successful on the pitch, winning five and losing just two of their matches. An analysis of the tourists' performances in domestic cricket indicates that the squad was representative of the best Philadelphia had to offer at that time and it is argued that the visit should be considered as a bona fide tour of importance, even though it originated from a part of the world where cricket was on its last legs.* (Stock ref 8461) **£38**

The Jack Crossland story was one of the key moments in the late nineteenth century history of cricket. Despite being reckoned by many good judges to be one of the fastest bowlers of his generation, the controversy over the Lancashire player's action always overshadowed his career and at one time threatened to tear the very fabric of the game apart. Two cricketing greats were on opposing sides in this debate - Red Rose icon AN Hornby, who was Crossland's captain, stood resolutely behind his man, while the redoubtable Lord Harris of Kent waged a relentless campaign to have him banned. Ultimately, Harris held sway and Crossland, who was never no-balled in a first-class match, was forced out of the game, not for throwing, but because the MCC ruled he had broken the residential regulations of the day. Either way, the end of his first-class Lancashire career robbed the Old Trafford faithful of one of their favourite sons - a player who always gave his best and whose cheerful demeanour could never disguise his fierce competitiveness.

But that all changed on an astonishing third day's play. Lancashire had begun that morning seven runs behind with three wickets in hand. It couldn't have been closer as each side surrendered and then regained the initiative. But that was all to change over the course of two amazing sessions of play. The author first met Frank Hayes in 1962 when they were both in the Salford Schoolboys' team that played in the Lancashire Schools cricket competition. One of them went on to play for, and later captain, Lancashire County Cricket Club, scored a century on his England Test debut, and was seen as the new hero of the English game. The other played a lot of 2nd XI cricket in the Bolton Association! Eight years after he had single handedly won the Lancashire Schools Cup, and after completing his education at Sheffield University, Hayes made his belated first-class debut for Lancashire. Within a couple of years, the author's admiration of him as a cricketer and person, led to him taking out a membership at Lancashire so that he could continue to enjoy the special talents of his former teammate.

This is the story of the career of Len Hopwood, one of Lancashire's finest inter-war cricketers. The only Lancashire cricketer to achieve the double of 1,000 runs and 100 wickets in a single season of first-class cricket on two separate occasions, he won three County Championships with Lancashire, in 1928, 1930, and 1934, ending his career in 1939 with 15,548 runs and 673 wickets to his name. After the war, he became a respected journalist and in later life served on the County's committee before, in 1980, he became the first former Lancashire professional to be elected President of the Club.

Issued to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the inaugural one day limited overs Gillette Cup cricket match, the booklet features an account of the encounter between Lancashire and Leicestershire at Old Trafford on 1, 2 May 1963. Rain meant that play was spread over two days, with the home side emerging victorious thanks to a fine performance by all-rounder Peter Marnier, who scored a century and took three wickets. He was duly awarded the new competition's first "Man of the Match" award by the Kent and England cricketer Frank Woolley. Only 60 copies printed.

Immediately after their final Test match of the summer, the 1924 South Africans travelled to Norwich to play a first-class match against the Minor Counties, who included no fewer than seven Norfolcians in their eleven.

After the Great War there was a demand for international cricket to be resumed as quickly as possible in the summer of 1919. A fully representative Ashes series proved impossible to organise - instead a squad of Australian servicemen who were then based in England was put together, known as the Australian Imperial Forces (AIF) side. This squad made a full-length tour of England, playing 28 first class matches in front of large crowds. Their first fixture was against a team raised by Lionel Robinson, which was played at his estate deep in the Norfolk countryside. This book describes the genesis of this, the first international first-class match after the War. It gives a full report of the play, which ended tantalizingly when the AIF, who needed just nine runs to win with two wickets remaining, had to leave to catch a train.

Francis Terry was educated at Oxford University, where he failed to impress, either as a scholar or a cricketer. He had more success when playing in 10 first-class matches for Somersetshire between 1882 and 1885, even scoring a century against Hampshire. However, he appeared to have left cricket behind him when he trained to be a minister in the Church of England and seemed to be destined for an unremarkable, if worthy, life. Alas, Terry was unfortunate to succumb to severe mental ill health problems.

Edward 'Daddy' Long was the last cricketer to be selected to turn out for his county on the strength of his underarm, or 'lob', bowling. He played six matches for Norfolk in 1923 at the advanced age of 46 and was not unsuccessful, despite arguably being misused by his skipper, Michael Falcon. This book tells of how he mastered the art of lob bowling while playing for Barrow in the North Lancashire & District Cricket League and thoroughly bamboozled many batsmen in the decade before World War One.

John Tommy Tyldesley was England's best professional batsman of the so-called Golden Age. Tyldesley toured Australia in 1901-02 and 1903-04. Expectations were high and he did not disappoint. In the Second Test in January 1904 in Melbourne, Tyldesley played his greatest ever innings in Australia. On a difficult, sticky wicket, John Tommy made 62 in England's total of 103. England won the Test and eventually the series. Albert Knight wrote in the Sheffield Daily Telegraph that Tyldesley's 'batting in this match overshadowed that of Trumper'. Rare praise indeed. Before 1914, Tyldesley and Trumper were the two best batsmen on wet wickets. No wonder Knight describes Tyldesley as the 'heart and hope' of the side. Tyldesley was a player who knew his worth. With Len Braund, he tried to get more money from the MCC for the 1903-04 tour. They failed. The hard-headed Tyldesley would not be fooled again.

Archie MacLaren recorded the 100th century for the club. This history recalls the 21 batsmen who scored centuries for the county up to 1900 and tells the story of the county championship match in which MacLaren's historic innings took place.

26. 'Someday he'll be a better bat than ever I was.' Ernest Tyldesley in the Minor Counties Championship. Lancashire CCC 1906 to 1908. 2024. 8vo (iv) + 40pp, illustrated. **Limited edition of 66 copies, the first 15 of which were issued in a signed, hardback edition.** Original pictorial hard cloth, **new.** *Ernest Tyldesley scored more first-class runs and centuries for Lancashire County Cricket Club than any other batsman, surpassing records previously held by his elder brother, the legendary "Worsley wonder," John Tommy Tyldesley. However, Ernest's early career with the county was not without its ups and downs. Indeed, his performances for the Lancashire 2nd XI in the Minor Counties Championship in the early part of the 20th century were mediocre in the extreme. His later successes in both first-class and Test cricket may have come as a pleasant surprise to many cricket followers who had watched him at the crease in the early stages of his professional career. However, they came as no surprise to his brother, who, the esteemed cricket writer Neville Cardus recalled, had presciently remarked, 'Someday, he'll be a better bat than ever I was.'* (Stock ref 8446) **£36**

Over the course of his long and distinguished career in first-class cricket, Lancashire's John Tommy Tyldesley gained a reputation as one of the best batsmen of his generation on rain-affected pitches. And the featured match, between Lancashire and the Australians at Old Trafford in 1899, perfectly illustrates this. On a wicket that was 'playing queerly', Tyldesley scored 56 and 42 while his teammates could only muster 58 runs between them in Lancashire's two completed innings.

The 17th Australians arrived at the Fry's Ground, Bristol, undefeated outside of the Test matches; they had regained the Ashes with a 2-1 series triumph. Since 1878 Australian tourists had played over 600 games in the UK and none of them had resulted in a tie. History was to be re-written after three dramatic days in August 1930 when Gloucestershire became the county that came the nearest to defeating the 1930 Australians. In the event the match ended in a dramatic tie, both sides scoring 274 runs. It was a bowler's match as Parker and Goddard were the champions for the home side while Grimmett and Hornibrook did the damage for the tourists.
